



Our target is to recycle at least **40%** of waste by 2020.

Camden currently recycles **26%** of its waste, using recycling boxes, bags or wheelie bins.

How can I recycle my house hold waste?

You can recycle:

- Paper, card, cardboard
- ✓ Glass bottles & jars
- Food tins, aerosols, cans and foil
- ✓ Food & drinks cartons
- Plastic food trays, tubs, bags and bottles.

Please don't put in black sacks, bubble wrap, polystyrene, and other types of mixed metal or glass (coat hangers, light bulbs etc).





















Do I have to rinse everything out?


We do ask that you don't put half empty etc. containers into the recycling. It's also more likely to keep your recycling bags/boxes cleaner (and smell free) for longer as well if you do rinse them out.

How can I recycle my food waste?

Kerbside food recycling

Line your green kitchen caddy with a compostable caddy liner or use it on its own.

Please place your bag of food into your outdoor food waste caddy.

Estates food recycling

Line your green kitchen caddy with a compostable caddy liner which you can get from your caretaker.

Food waste recycling FAQs

Estates and Kerbsides:

Mhat do I do if I have leftovers in food containers/takeaway containers

Please empty the food into your caddy and recycle the plastic packaging . Polystyrene food containers should not be put in the recycling bins.

Mow do I keep my kitchen caddy clean? Rinse it out or wash up your caddy regularly.



Will having food waste in my kitchen attract flies, maggots & mice?

No. Please keep your caddy lid closed when not in use and store out of direct sunlight or away from heat source.

My caddy is broken/there was no kitchen caddy when I moved in.

You can order a new kitchen caddy online at: https://contact.camden.gov.uk/environmentservices/.

The food is taken to the <u>London waste EcoPark</u> where it is turned into compost so that it can be used in parks and farms.



If I run out of caddy liners, can I use carrier plastic bags?

No. Please do not use plastic carrier bags or any other alternative plastic bags. Please use compostable liners. You can order free liners at

http://www.camden.gov.uk/recycling or via 020 7974 4444.

Mhat do I do if the outside bins are full?

If the outside bin is full, please put the bag in the nearest refuse/rubbish bin. Please report the full bin to your caretaker or call Camden on **020 7974 4444**.

Kerbsides only:

My food waste bin has not been emptied in weeks, what should I do?

As soon as your notice a missed collection, please report it. You can call or report a missed collection online at: https://contact.camden.gov.uk/environmentservices/.

Where is my garden and food waste recycled?

How is it used?

- Compost can be applied in a range of end uses, within full-scale agriculture, landscaping, gardens and brownfield sites.
- It can be used as a soil improver, mulch, topsoil constituent, turf dressing, and growing medium constituent.

Where can I buy a compost bin?

- You can purchase discounted and subsidised composters and wormeries at www.camden.getcomposting.com or call **0844 571 4444.**
- If home composting isn't for you, you can still do your bit and reduce the amount sent to landfill by recycling your kitchen waste using your kitchen caddy.



If you don't have a reusable garden waste bag, you can order it for free online.



Contamination

When recycling is contaminated with general waste, none of the contents of that bin can be recycled and it must be either incinerated or sent to landfill. Recycling is much better for the environment and for every tonne that we recycle taxpayers save money.

These are a few of the most common things that **should not** be put in our recycling bins:

Waste Electrical & Electronic Equipment (WEEE)

Can it be reused?


If the item is still in good working order, pass it on to someone else who could use it or give it away through the <u>Camden's reuse</u> service.


If not, how do I recycle it?

It's easy to check if an electrical item, toy or game is recyclable. Simply ask the following questions:

- Does it have a plug?
- Does it use batteries?
- Does it need charging?
- Does it have a picture of a crossed out wheelie bin on it?







If you answer **yes** to any of these, **it can be recycled** in one of the following ways:

- Book a free collection at home at: www.123recycleforfree.com, Tel: 020 3457 5681.
- Drop off at Regis Road Recycling and Reuse Centre Free to Camden residents.
- If not, take them to your local on street small WEEE recycling banks.

Often shops will collect your unwanted electricals when they deliver your new one - especially larger items like TV's, fridges and freezers.

Recycling provision exists in over 75% of councils (including both household recycling collections and at recycling centres). A household recycling collection exists in less than 75% of councils.

Plastic films

Some plastic films can also now be recycled at supermarket's carrier bag collection points. Look out for the 'Recycle with carrier bags at large stores - not at kerbside' message on your bread bag, breakfast cereal, toilet and kitchen roll wraps, grocery produce, multipack shrink wrap and newspaper and magazine wraps. What to do with plastic films.

EMPTY METAL PAINT CAN

Metal paint cans

Empty metal paint cans are accepted for recycling at most local authority recycling centres. Check your council's website for more information. What to do with paint cans.

Remember: not all packaging will have a recycling label but this doesn't mean you can't recycle it. If you're not sure what you can recycle in your area, check the <u>recycling locator</u>.

Recycling symbols – what do they mean?



Mobius Loop

Indicates that an object is capable of being recycled - not that the object has been recycled or will be accepted in all recycling collection systems. Sometimes this symbol is used with a percentage figure in the middle to explain that the packaging contains x% of recycled material.



Tidyman

Dispose of this carefully and thoughtfully. Do not litter. This doesn't relate to recycling, but is a reminder to be a good citizen, disposing of the item in the most appropriate manner.

The Green Dot

The Green Dot does not necessarily mean that the packaging is recyclable, will be recycled, or has been recycled. It is a symbol used on packaging in many European countries and signifies that the producer has made a financial contribution towards the recovery and recycling of packaging..



Plastics

Identifies the type of plastic resin used to make the item by providing a 'Resin Identification Code'. It is represented with a 'chasing arrows' symbol surrounding a number between 1 and 7 that defines the resin used.

What to do with plastic



Glass

Please dispose of glass bottles and jars in a bottle bank (but remember to separate colours) or use your glass household recycling collection if you have one.

What to do with glass



Recyclable aluminium

The item is made of recyclable aluminium.

What to do with aluminium



Recyclable steel

The product is made of recyclable steel.

What to do with steel



Waste electricals

Waste electrical items - from household appliances to mobile phones to IT equipment - can be recycled if you see this symbol. What to do with electricals



Compostable

The 'seedling' is the registered trademark of European Bioplastics. Products certified to be industrially compostable according to the European standard EN 13432/14955 may bear the 'seedling' logo.



Wood

The Forest Stewardship
Council (FSC) logo identifies products
which contain wood from well
managed forests independently
certified in accordance with the rules
of the FSC.



Paper

To be given the National Association of Paper Merchants' mark, paper or board must be made from a minimum of 50%, 75% or 100% genuine waste paper and/or board fibre, no part of which should contain mill produced waste fibre

Common myths and problems

It all goes to landfill.

•It wouldn't make sense for us to set up this system if that was the case. Once we have collected and sorted the materials they become a valuable and sellable resource.

don't believe in it./Don't have the time for it.

It costs the council to send your waste to land fill. You don't have to recycle everything in the one go.
 Recycling in Camden is really easy, with recycling bins on the street and collections from your home or estate.

It doesn't matter where I put it or what I put in, as they sort it all out at the other end anyway.

- •We only sort out the recycling; your black sack rubbish goes to landfill or incineration.
- •The recycling in the green bag/boxes goes to a facility (MRF) which sorts and separates out the cans & bottles etc.
- •The recycling is inspected before it is processed, so it may be rejected if they see too many of the wrong items. You should avoid putting in black sacks, bubble wrap, polystyrene, and other types of metal or glass (coat hangers, light bulbs etc. they can be done at Regis road recycling & reuse centre).

I can't carry all the recycling in one go.

•Some residents find it easier to do it a bit at a time as they leave the house - just making it part of the day's routine. However, we do also offer an assisted collection service. For more information, please call 0207 974 4444.

Food waste recycling smells or attracts rodents.

• Studies show no increase in rodents; separating out your food waste into lockable containers should actually reduce the chances of vermin and smells compared to a black sack. It also helps if you store the cadies out of heat/direct sunlight. Rinsing out the caddy can help as well as well. Some residents find liners help.





Common myths and problems continue...

I don't recycle food waste because of flies/maggots.

- •Good housekeeping is the best approach to reducing problems with flies and maggots (a problem mainly during the warmer summer months.)
- •try to avoid leaving food uncovered in the kitchen
- •deal with smelly food such as leftover fish and meat waste quickly
- •if possible keep your caddies out of direct sunlight and away from open doors
- •keep the caddy lids shut at all times when they are not in use
- regularly clean (strong fragrance deters flies) your kitchen and outdoor caddy, removing any residual food
- •try not to have too much left over food, this will reduce the amount you throw away and save you money
- if you are still having problems, try using compostable caddy liners.

I don't have space to recycle food as well.

•Some residents prefer to use smaller things like ice cream tubs, the bigger style yogurt pots or just liners on their own. Your food waste can then be emptied straight into a caddy or brown food waste bin. We provide a free green caddy for you to use; you can still recycle food without it.

The liners break.

- •Some residents find liners help; you can use the caddy on its own but please don't use any shopping plastic carriage bags.
- •We recommend you let food cool down and drain of any excess liquid before putting it in your caddy. Emptying your caddy regularly also helps.

I use a waste disposal for my food waste.

•Well that is better than nothing! The main difference is that our food waste recycling scheme reduces the stress on our Victorian sewers, uses less of your electricity and water, and the resulting product can be used again as a soil improver.
